# Father's message

#### **KEEP THE FIRE GOING!**

"When the sinner renounces sin to become law-abiding and honest, he deserves to live." (Ezekiel 18:27) "Jesus said to the chief priests and elders of the people..." (Matthew 21:28)

- Chief priests and elders were those who knew the Law and observed it rigorously.
  - people who knew the Law and practised it in great detail
  - they were doing what is right, what is meant to fuel our relationship with God, to nourish it and make it grow
  - God "owed" them their salvation in virtue of their observance
  - their approach to God was a bargain, not the experience of God's love and mercy for them

"Tax collectors and prostitutes are making their way into the kingdom of God before you." (Matthew 21:31) Tax collectors and prostitutes had the only asset of a personal relationship with Jesus.

- they betrayed their faith (God is their only ruler) and their nation (they served the Romans) or the morals of the Law (adultery)
- they could not claim that God owed them anything; they did not care for the Law and its practice they did not do what was right
- they experienced in Jesus the mercy and love of God who looks for them, does not condemn them, gives them a new chance
- painting of the call of Matthew, "really? Me?"

Each of these two categories has something the other needs. They need to meet.

The leaders had the right works and habits but lacked the experience of God's love. They had the firewood, but no fire to fuel. The sinners had the experience of God's love and lacked the means to sustain it. They had the fire but no firewood to keep it going.

We have been brought up - with no fault of anyone - to relate to our faith in terms of doing the right thing: going to church, praying, receiving the sacraments, keeping devotions, etc. We were taught to "keep the Law".

Nothing wrong with this. Only, this is what is supposed to fuel our growing relationship with Jesus. This is the core, the goal, the final outcome. The good habits and works we were taught are like the firewood to keep the fire going. We want the fire (our relationship with Jesus). We were taught to pile up firewood, but not to light the fire.

I meet people who were active in our community for years, and then life got in the way, and they gave up. Why pile up firewood if there is no fire? Am I not one of these people who do things because they have to, at times?

We have new people coming in, who were touched by the love and mercy of God. They are on fire, and need means to sustain it, to keep it going. They need the firewood of the good habits and works, of the Sacrament, of the Scripture. They have the fire and have to learn to keep it going.

These two categories need to meet.

I need both: the fire of my relationship with Jesus and the good habits to keep it going.

I am the Pharisee or the Tax collector type? I need to meet the other, right here among us!
