### **GOSPEL**:

Mark 1:14-20

After John had been arrested, Jesus went into Galilee. There he proclaimed the Good News from God. 'The time has come' he said 'and the kingdom of God is close at hand. Repent, and believe the Good News.' As he was walking along by the Sea of Galilee he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net in the lake – for they were fishermen. And Jesus said to them, 'Follow me and I will make you into fishers of men.' And at once they left their nets and followed him.

Going on a little further, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John; they too were in their boat, mending their nets. He called them at once and, leaving their father Zebedee in the boat with the men he employed, they went after him.

# Father's message

Time to drop our nets.

"They left their nets and followed him." (Mark 1:18)

"Leaving their father Zebedee in the boat with the men he employed, they went after him." (Mark 1:20)

The four gospels, read together, give us a few more details than these about the decision of these men to follow Jesus.

Last Sunday's gospel passage is an example of those details.

We may therefore be justified to think that their decision was probably not as abrupt as it appears from this passage alone. Be as it may, one thing is clear: Simon, Andrew, James and John made a free and conscious decision to "drop their nets" and throw in their lot with Jesus. They chose Jesus as their Master. They became his disciples. They still had a long way to go. They were not saints. They still had a lot to learn, like we can see in the gospels. They would fail and fall and start again. Yet, they had made up their mind. They had made their choice.

I am not a disciple unless I choose to.

Not because I was born in a Catholic family.

Not because I went to a Catholic school.

Not because I was born in a Catholic country.

Not even just because I was baptised and went through all the sacraments, "went through the mill".

If I were a Catholic because of my culture, I would not last.

It does not work that way. We can only be disciples because we choose it.

Have I intentionally chosen to be a Catholic?

If not, today is a great day to do so.

To be a disciple of Jesus, I need to choose it - to want it in practice.

#### What step can I take today to "drop my nets"? How to keep Jesus at the centre of every breath I take.

### NINIVEH

The historical Nineveh was the capital of the neo-Assyrian empire in the late seventh century B.C.E. There was no love lost between the ancient Israelites and Nineveh. The city's king, Sennacherib, laid siege to Jerusalem in 701 B.C.E. (2Kgs 18:13-19:37, Isa 36-37).

The prophetic book of Nahum is an Israelite taunt-song over Nineveh's destruction by the Babylonians in 612 B.C.E. For Nahum, Nineveh is a "city of bloodshed" (Nah 3:1). The Assyrians' ruthless military tactics are also pictured in reliefs from the king's palace in Nineveh, now in the British Museum.

The other biblical depiction of Nineveh is in the book of Jonah. There, Nineveh is described as huge—taking three days to walk across—and thoroughly evil. But Jonah gives no specifics about the city's evil beyond the king's command that citizens turn away "from the violence that is in their hands" (Jonah 3:8).

Outside of the Bible, Nineveh was known for having been a great, lawless, and ruined city. Greek literary giants like Herodotus and Aristotle catalogue its sinfulness, describing Sardanapalus, its legendary last king, in unflattering (and problematic) terms. ### **SEA OF GALILEE**

The Sea of Galilee is fed by the Jordan River, rainfall and springs on the northern side. More properly designated a lake, the Kinneret (the Old Testament and modern name) is 13 miles (21 km) long and 7 miles (11 km) wide. At its deepest point, the lake is only 150 feet (45 m) deep. The rabbis said of it, "Although God has created seven seas, yet He has chosen this one as His special delight."

The peaceful calm of the Sea of Galilee can quickly become transformed by a violent storm. Winds funnel through the east-west aligned Galilee hill country and stir up the waters quickly. More violent are the winds that come off the hills of the Golan Heights to the east. Trapped in the basin, the winds can be deadly to fishermen. A storm in March 1992 sent waves 10 feet (3m) high crashing into downtown Tiberias and causing significant damage. https://www.bibleplaces.com/seagalilee/
